Accessing theses from Birkbeck and elsewhere

Birkbeck theses

Print copies of Birkbeck PhD, MPhil and DPsych theses are kept in closed-access stores. To request a thesis fill in and submit the Store Request online form at

<http://vufind.lib.bbk.ac.uk/libforms/storeform.htm>.

Requests placed Sunday to Thursday will be available after 13.00 the next day. Requests placed Friday to Saturday will be available after 13.00 on Monday.

The Library does not hold some PhD theses for the following subjects: Classics, German, History and Law. Theses in these subjects are sometimes held in the Libraries of the appropriate Institutes of the School of Advanced Study.

Theses on the Library catalogue

Most Birkbeck PhD and MPhil theses from 1995 onwards are on the catalogue.

Searching by author and title

If you know the author and/or title of a thesis, enter the author's surname and/or a distinctive word from the title.

Searching by subject

To find a thesis submitted to a particular Birkbeck Department or School, enter the Department or School and *theses*. E.g. enter *biology theses* to retrieve theses submitted to the Biology department. Results can be narrowed by also adding a year to the original search, e.g. *biology theses 2011*.

Searching by year

To look for all theses held for a particular year, choose **Shelfmark** from the dropdown menu and enter *theses/*, followed by the year, e.g. *theses/2001*.

Early Birkbeck theses

If you require details of an earlier Birkbeck thesis which is not on the catalogue, refer to the national database Index to Theses: <http://www.theses.com/>.

All Birkbeck theses, whether or not they are on the catalogue, can be requested via the Store Request online form: <http://vufind.lib.bbk.ac.uk/libforms/storeform.htm>.

Other UK theses

Index to Theses provides bibliographic references to most doctoral theses published by UK and Irish universities, with coverage dating back to 1716.

To consult a doctoral thesis that has been awarded by a UK University, either contact the relevant University Library to enquire about access or go to the British Library's Electronic Theses Online System (EThOS) website <http://ethos.bl.uk> to see if it is possible to download a digitised copy (details below).

NB. Senate House Library no longer holds copies of most University of London theses.



ETHOS

The British Library no longer supplies microfilm or print copies of UK theses through inter-library loan. Users now request online access to theses via the British Library ETHOS service rather than through their university libraries.

How to join ETHOS

Join ETHOS by going to <http://ethos.bl.uk> and clicking on **Login/Register** and then **Register**. You only need to register once, though each time you wish to request or download a thesis, you will be required to login.

Requesting a UK doctoral thesis using ETHOS

Search for a thesis on ETHOS and, if found, click on **View Thesis**. ETHOS will then allow digitised theses to be downloaded by registered users. If a thesis has not been requested in the past, the display will state: 'Note that this thesis is not yet available for immediate download. Estimated digitisation and delivery time is currently 30 working days.' To continue with a request for the thesis you will need to login or register and follow the online instructions.

International theses

Eligible Birkbeck students can request overseas theses through our Inter-Library Loan service <http://www.bbk.ac.uk/lib/about/how/ill>. Undergraduate and Taught Postgraduate students are required to pay the full cost for these requests; Research Postgraduates and Academic Staff can place overseas theses requests free of charge.

Birkbeck electronic theses on ORBIT

Since 2012 we have accepted electronic theses as part of the submission procedure for Birkbeck doctorates. Users can access our Birkbeck e-theses through ORBIT. Full details are on the webpage: <http://www.bbk.ac.uk/lib/elib/orbit-1>.

Access to Birkbeck theses by external users

Non-Birkbeck members can either use ORBIT or request electronic access to Birkbeck theses through ETHOS. External users wishing to consult print copies of Birkbeck theses should contact the Acquisitions and Metadata Team (j.kaufmann@bbk.ac.uk).
