CIMR Debates in Public Policy Series

CIMR organised a set of lunchtime one-hour online debates on topical issues. In each, leading scholars and practitioners presented their ideas on current economic, innovation and policy issues. The audience had the chance to respond to their ideas.

Wednesday 5th May – "Knowledge economy cities vs left-behind places: can the gulf be narrowed?" Chaired by Birkbeck's Dr Frederick Guy, guest speakers Professor Marvann P. Feldman and Dr Thomas Kemeny explored the regional inequalities generated by the technological revolution and possible policy solutions. The presentations were followed by discussion from Professor Raquel Ortega-Argilés (Department of Strategy and International Business and City-REDI Research Institute, Birmingham Business School), who highlighted some outlier nations: South Korea, for example, has an extremely high concentration of inventors in large metro areas, but with no greater number of patents than inventors in non-metro regions, while Germany offers an example of a more balanced distribution of knowledge and innovation activity.

Wednesday May 19th – "Measurement of interdisciplinarity and synergy"

This debate was chaired by Dr Federica Rossi, with discussion

from Adrian Day. Professor Loet Leydesdorff discussed a new methodology for measuring interdisciplinarity and synergy and its application. Loet concluded by suggesting that interdisciplinarity is an important factor for research management, whereas synergy is more important from a social perspective.

Wednesday May 26th – "The effects of changes in university funding on knowledge

transfer" Dr Abhijit Sengupta, Dr Andrea Filippetti and Dr Alex Chaix shared insight in this panel discussion, chaired by the CIMR's Dr Federica Rossi. Dr Abhijit Sengupta kicked off the session by sharing the findings of a paper written with Dr Federica Rossi exploring how changes to university funding have impacted knowledge exchange profiles. Abhijit was followed by Dr Andrea Filippetti, who shared insight into the impact of public versus private funding sources on research activity.

Wednesday June 9th – "Green Finance and innovation"

Chaired by <u>Professor Michael</u> <u>Mainelli</u>, Executive Chairman, Z/Yen Group, the discussion explored investor sentiment towards green investment and how fintech innovation could support the transition to green finance. <u>Dr Ellen Yu</u> began the discussion by sharing research exploring whether

environmental innovation can help firms access cheaper finance. Dr Alessandra Tanda shared developments in digital finance that could support the green transition. Harry Elliott shared his professional experience in environmental innovation. Dr Bac Van Luu gave wider context to the discussion by highlighting five long-term trends in sustainable finance from the perspective of the investor or asset manager.

Tuesday June 14th -"Knowledge, Intensive **Business Services: post**pandemic new normal" In a joint event hosted by Birkbeck's Department of Management and Essex Business School, Professors Ian Miles and David Doloreux outlined their view of the postpandemic new normal for KIBS. As Chair, Dr Muthu De Silva, Director of Research in Birkbeck's Department of Management began with discussion from Professor David Doloreux on KIBS and their kev characteristics.

The presentations were followed by discussion from the audience, which featured a diverse mix of policy makers, academics and early career researchers, and a vote of thanks from Professor Suma Athreye, Essex Business School.

Wednesday June 30th "Knowledge, Skills and Regional Divides" Chaired by Dr Frederick Guy, Dr Maria Abreu and Dr Marte C.W. Solheim shared insight into the relationship between region and skills in this public policy workshop. Dr Marte C.W. Solheim highlighted that a region's innovation system consists of two sub-systems: industry and knowledge infrastructure. Dr Maria Abreu continued the discussion with an exploration of the links between skills and productivity and regional variations. In response to these presentations, discussant Federica Rossi asked whether digital innovation was exacerbating regional divides, as high tech versus traditional industries differ in terms of productivity growth and in the regions in which they operate.

discussions about the theory of mind, consciousness and ethics. This has sometimes impeded real innovation. Our two speakers exemplify the attempts to house-train AI and de-risk it to the point that investors, founders, managers and researchers can at least know where to look for solutions and recognise good quality when they see AI applied in the real world.
