Admissions requirements

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

Course aims

This course introduces you to the academic study of film, television and screenwriting, with an emphasis on developing your creative skills in a range of practice-oriented modules. The degree will equip you with core knowledge and practice-based skills for work in film and media organisations, and in the creative industries. Our courses are taught by highly experienced tutors with links in key film and media institutions.

Throughout the course you will combine written and practical work in your experience and understanding of film and television theory and history, screenwriting and script editing. Through a range of exercises you will learn new skills in image and sound editing, in developing script projects and digital media strategies, while enhancing your writing, research and presentation skills as a creative professional.

As the course structure demonstrates below, depending on what specific areas of film and media you are most interested in, you can tailor your studies so that you exit with a degree in **Film and Media Practice; or Film, Media with Screenwriting.**

You can also choose to study towards a **BA Film and Media with Environmental Studies**, by selecting 90 credits of your options from the list of Environmental Studies modules below.

Course structure

FT students can take no more than 60 credits in any one term, and no less than 30. PT students will be expected/required to take no more than 45 credits in any one term, and no less than 30.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

Teaching on this course is a combination of lectures, seminars and practice-based work. Lectures are designed to provide you with an outline or overview of the topic, to engage you with the material and direct you to other resources. They are a springboard for your own learning. Seminars are group sessions where you will be asked to contribute to discussion or group work around the topic, with material set in advance for which you need to prepare. For practice-based sessions you will put your learning into practice.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment:

- Essays, reviews, reports, scripts, logs, posters
- oral, audio or video presentations (usually with a written report)
- group and individual projects: short videos, video essays
- digital media/design exercises

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

By the end of the BA Film and Media course, you can expect to be able to:

- Discuss theories and concepts relating to film, TV and media, and understand their historical development
- Understand film, TV and media language, narrative, genre and audiences in a variety of cultural, international and commercial contexts
- Critically analyse texts in different forms of media
- Assess a wide variety of information in different media, and present theoretical and empirical arguments about the use and role of media
- Critically evaluate arguments and evidence, including your own work, and conduct academic research in the fields of film, media and related cultural inquiry.
- Evaluate appropriate uses of new technologies for researching areas of the media (multimedia and web design modules)
- Develop ideas and creative projects through group work (web design, screenwriting, film and TV projects), and to gain skills in working with others and exchanging ideas
- Work effectively as part of a team and individually to meet deadlines and manage your time and workload

In addition, students on the **Media Practice pathway**, can expect to be able to:

- Communicate ideas in visual form (eg video making) and apply theory to practice
- Analyse a creative brief and to identify appropriate creative models
- Develop ideas and creative projects through group work (web design, screenwriting, film and TV projects), and to gain skills in working with others and exchanging ideas
- Work effectively as part of a team and individually to meet deadlines and manage your time and workload
- Participate in Birkbeck's Student Film and Media Festival at the end of the academic year to showcase your creative practice (e.g. short film, video essay, audio work, poster)
- Consider possible careers in a range of film, TV and media fields, including curation, programming, as well as video content creation using found footage and archives

Students on the **Screenwriting pathway** can expect to be able to:

- create, develop and write their own script projects

- have a good understanding and insight into the development and pre-production processes as well as a wider knowledge of film and TV drama
- gain skills in working with others and exchanging ideas
- Work effectively as part of a team and individually to meet deadlines and manage your time and workload
- to consider possible careers in development, script editing and creative producing, and to understand their relevance to film and TV distribution and marketing

Careers and further study

You will find Film, Media and Screenwriting graduates in the following kinds of roles:

- Curator/Programmer in a variety of media and cultural organisations
- Creative/Admin/technical support in film/media projects
- Assisting with screenwriting and script editing in film/TV and other media projects
- Variety of roles in film and media marketing, publicity material production and advertising
- Film/video editor
- Web editor and designer for film/media organisations and projects
- Teacher in Media and Media education in primary, secondary schools and other educational settings
- Programme researcher, broadcasting/film/multimedia
- Digital content provider and creator

Birkbeck's BA Film and Media graduates will complete with a set of valuable attributes, for example:

- Research skills
- Skills in evaluating and assessing different types of information

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback. Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.
