Birkbeck's BA Theatre Studies puts you at the heart of central London's dynamic arts and culture scene. Taught by world-leading academics and award-winning theatre makers, your academic study of theatre history, theory, and practice will grow out of the here and now of London theatre today. Alongside your in-depth study of theatre, you will have the option to minor in one of the following five areas of study:

- Film and Media Studies
- English
- Creative Writing
- Arts Management
- Environmental Studies

Why Choose This Course

- Throughout your degree you will visit the world's most exciting theatre institutions, attend cutting-edge performances, and learn to analyse them within the context of global theatre history and contemporary theatre theory.
- You will design your own approach to the interdisciplinary study of theatre with the flexibility to pursue your individual interests and professional ambitions.
- You will gain access to knowledge, skills, and networks that will support your future career in the creative industries including our suite of professional development modules such as 'Working in the Creative and Cultural Sector', 'Writing for the Workplace', and 'The Art of Public Speaking'.
- You will have the option to pursue a minor in secondary discipline that will compliment your study of theatre and increase your employability across the creative industries

What Will You Learn

You will study the history of theatre from Ancient Greece to today. You will explore the significance of theatre practice as a mode of entertainment, a method of social engagement, and a forum for self-expression. Your study of theatre at Birkbeck will explore questions such as: What role does the audience play in the making of meaning in performance? How do cultural policies shape the international theatre repertoire? What are the histories and legacies behind the development of theatrical forms such as Political Theatre, Ancient Greek Theatre, Live Art, and Christmas Pantos?

BA Theatre Studies at Birkbeck does not offer actor training. It offers you the chance to follow your passion and gain an in-depth understanding of the role of theatre within a broader study of arts, culture, history, theory, and practice. With its interdisciplinary focus, this degree is ideal for students with a keen sense of their own curiosity and an enthusiasm for all things theatre and performance.

How Will You Learn

Throughout your degree, you will take a series of three modules called 'Theatre in London Now'. In these weekly lecture-seminars, you will analyse a set of live and recorded performances carefully selected to demonstrate the diversity of contemporary London theatre. You will analyse these performances alongside your study of key histories and concepts in global theatre studies.

Alongside your 'Theatre in London Now' modules, you will take a series of three critical practice modules ('Performing Theatre Histories', 'Arts of Adaptation: Creative Climates', and 'Performing Environments') in which you will apply practice-based methods to explore the theories and ideas that inform the most urgent issues of our time. Through collaborative theatre making, these modules offer students the structures through which to extend their understanding of theatre history and theory through devising, creating, and developing interdisciplinary creative projects.

In addition to your theatre studies modules, you will also have the option to choose a minor in a secondary discipline. Inspired by your individual interest and professional ambitions, you will work closely with your programme director to choose between optional modules across the School of Creative Arts, Culture and Communication with available modules in Film and Media, English, Creative Writing, Arts Management, and Environmental Studies.

In your final year you will develop an Independent Research Project that builds upon your experiences of interdisciplinary study throughout your degree and helps to prepare you for your next steps whether those may be towards further study or as an industry professional. Your dissertation project may take the form of an academic dissertation, an original performance, or a creative project presentation, depending on your artistic and academic interests and your career trajectory.

This course is available full-time or part-time. It has an evening timetable with classes taking place in the evening. It also includes a Foundation Year route for students who have not previously studied the relevant subjects or did not achieve the grades you need for a place on your chosen undergraduate degree.

Minor Pathways:

The following breakdown details **indicative options** for students who choose to minor in a secondary discipline. The range of options depend on what modules are offered each year. Students will work in collaboration with their programme director to ensure the choice of appropriate modules. With 210 credits in theatre studies and an additional 90 credits in a minor, students who choose to minor in a secondary discipline will also have the space to take two 30-credit modules beyond theatre studies and outside their designated minor. This pattern varies only for students who choose to minor in Environmental Studies. As two of the compulsory Theatre Studies modules also count towards that minor, students would need to choose only one additional option in Environmental Studies to meet the required 90-credit threshold and therefore will have greater optionality throughout the degree.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

Learning on BA Theatre Studies makes use of a mix of techniques and strategies, including:

- Lectures
- Seminars
- Practice-based workshops and rehearsals
- Tutorial support
- Independent visits to theatre performances
- Independent study and research
- Group-based study and research
- Access to public events hosted by Birkbeck Centre for Contemporary Theatre.

Students will learn primarily through the three key pedagogical practices central to Theatre Studies at BA level: lectures, seminar discussions and workshops. Lectures provide students with key information regarding topics or themes. Seminars are interactive, and involve students' advance preparation of materials, often focused by a series of set questions or prompts. Workshops enable students to explore the concepts they are introduced to in seminars and lectures through practice. This enables students to take a 'laboratory' approach, whereby they test and investigate practical strategies, effects and outcomes of theatre and performance through practice. This process of learning will be supplemented by independent research

(involving the use of libraries, internet resources, and archives), independent individual and group work, and theatre visits.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment.

Assessment methods include:

- Research essays
- Research exercises
- Performance presentations
- Creative projects, practice, and portfolios
- Critical reflections on practical work
- Individual and group presentations

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

At the end of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the key theatre traditions, conventions, contexts, histories, concepts, cultures and institutions with a particular focus on how those histories and traditions relate to analysis of contemporary theatre in London today
- 2. Show awareness of the range and variety of key critical and theoretical debates at the forefront of the fields of theatre and chosen pathway
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of how the key elements and processes of theatrical performance are created and realised;
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the interplay between practice and theory;
- 5. Evidence ability to describe, theorise, interpret, analyse, historicise and evaluate theatre and performance texts and events from a range of critical perspectives;
- 6. Utilise research skills, including the ability to gather, sift and organise material independently and critically and to present it in the form of an essay, report, presentation or creative piece
- 7. Discuss and evaluate your own work and the work of fellow students and established theatre and performance artists in relation to elements of theatre and performance process and practice;
- 8. Work efficiently and constructively within a group and on an individual basis to realise an appropriate practice-based piece or presentation of a specified length;
- 9. Present and sustain arguments and engage in debate;
- 10. Act as a reflective, self-directed learner, recognizing and employing a range of strategies to support independent learning, including an awareness of strengths/weaknesses.
- 11. Communicate in public and in working groups with expressive clarity and sophistication;
- 12. Apply the expressive, critical and evaluative skills acquired during the programme to varied kinds of work;
- 13. Communicate ideas and arguments clearly in a variety of oral, written, visual and performance media;

- 14. Demonstrate some IT skills; the use of libraries and electronic sources of information, online discussion groups, web-based research, e-learning, word-processing;
- 15. Utilise bibliographical skills appropriate to the discipline, including accurate citation of sources and consistent use of conventions in the presentation of scholarly work.

For Students with a minor in Creative Writing:

- 1) Utilise critical skills in the close reading and analysis of creative texts.
- 2) Discuss and evaluate the work of fellow students and established writers in relation to elements of craft.
- 3) Use language more confidently, precisely, and imaginatively.

For Students with a minor in Film and Media:

- 1) Understand film, TV and media language, narrative, genre and audiences in a variety of cultural and international contexts
- 2) Critically analyse texts in different forms of media
- 3) Discuss theories and concepts relating to film, TV and media, and understand their historical development

For Students with a minor in English:

- 1) Demonstrate critical skills in the close reading and analysis of literary texts
- 2) Have a wider and deeper knowledge of English literature.
- 3) Recognize, discuss, and write about forms and genres of literary text.

For Students with a minor in Arts Management:

- 1) Develop skills, knowledge and understanding of specific sectors in arts management and practice
- 2) Develop critical awareness and understanding of the perspectives of class, race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, disability and age in relation to policies, practices and personal development in the arts sector/s.
- 3) Enhance personal development in specific areas of arts and media studies and training

For Students with a minor in Environmental Studies

- Critically and creatively analyse different aspects and examples of how artists and activists across disciplines grapple with the complexities of climate and environmental concerns
- 2) Consider key academic approaches and debates in the study of environmental policy, art, politics, and culture.
- 3) Understand the relationship between arts and the environment by analysing a range of communicative modes and practice-based techniques to navigate the relationship between climate activism, art, and the humanities.

Careers and further study

Employers highly value the analytical, critical, communicative, and interpersonal skills that a Birkbeck degree in Theatre and Performance can offer. Theatre and Performance graduates leave with valuable attributes such as:

- High-level oral and written communication skills in English
- The ability to work efficiently and effectively as part of a team and on an individual basis
- Research skills
- Skills in analysis and argumentation

- Skills in evaluating and assessing ideas and information
- The ability to articulate yourself clearly, cogently and persuasively

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. Each new course or module is subject to a course approval process where the proposal is scrutinised by subject specialists, quality professionals and external representatives to ensure that it will offer an excellent student experience and meet the expectation of regulatory and other professional bodies.

You will be invited to participate in an online survey for each module you take. We take these surveys seriously and they are considered by the course team to develop both modules and the overall courses. Please take the time to complete any surveys you are sent as a student.

We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback.

Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our

Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.

The information in this programme specification has been approved by the College's Academic Board and every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the information it contains.
