Admissions requirements

Applicants need to have attained a 2:2 in their undergraduate degree (BA or equivalent). Applicants who have earned a mark below 2:2 will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

Course aims

This programme is designed for students who have completed an undergraduate degree and wish to quickly pivot and retrain as lawyers. This programme features a mixture of degree-level teaching of law-in-context, characteristic of Birkbeck Law's research-informed teaching, alongside skills-based teaching of legal doctrine and the application of legal rules. The programme will give students a firm grounding in the principles and application of law, while enabling them to engage in contemporary legal, social and political debates.

Exit Award: Graduate Diploma in Law - Core

If students do not successfully complete (pass) the two optional modules required by the Graduate Diploma in Law (GDL) but pass all required compulsory modules they may be eligible, at the discretion of the Sub-Board of Examiners, for the award of a Graduate Diploma in Law (GDL) - Core. The GDL – Core consists of 120 credits and retains all 7 foundational areas of legal knowledge as well as the introduction to law's basic principles (Legal Methods and Skills). Therefore, the GDL – Core will still fulfil the practical vocational use of educating students to be able to gain a place on SQE and Bar Training Courses.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Teaching and learning on this programme entails a blended approach, including:

- Pre-recorded lecture material, to be viewed asynchronously but prior to live sessions
- The provision of online materials, including readings, exercises and prompts
- Regular interactive seminar sessions
- Co-curricular career-related sessions and law research and legal practice events

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment.

The assessments on this programme consists of a mixture of the following methods:

- Formative guizzes administered in seminars
- Summative exams in the form of single best answer questions
- Summative exams in the form of problem-questions and/or essay questions

The mix of assessment types allows for the tailoring of assessment method to each specific legal topic, as some areas of law are most suitably assessed in open-ended essays that allow for expansive articulation of law-in-context, while other areas may be best assessed in the form of single-base-answer questions (e.g., assessments wherein the aim is to test the application of specific legal rules).

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

At the end of this course, you should be able to:

- Demonstrate good knowledge of the seven foundations of legal knowledge, in addition to two specialist areas of law
- Critically engage with sources of law, including cases, and scholarship from law and related fields
- · Apply principles of law
- Engage in basic legal research using specific legal resources
- Demonstrate knowledge of the routes to vocational qualification
- Demonstrate knowledge of career possibilities that follow on from legal qualification

Careers and further study

As a graduate of the GDL, you are one step closer on your career path to becoming a legal practitioner. Possible professions include:

- solicitor
- barrister
- policy adviser
- civil servant
- campaigner
- academic.

Alternatively, you may use your legal practice and critical reasoning skills within the industry in which you work, including in business, technology, the arts and NGOs.

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.
