Admissions requirements

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

A second-class honours degree (2:2) or above in any related subject; other qualifications will be considered. Applications are welcomed from those with or without prior experience in writing for screen and stage.

Students must specify their preferred pathway at point of application. Depending on the pathway, the following writing samples are required:

As part of the application process, applicants are required to submit the following in a single file:

• 15-20 pages of a play or a script for a film or TV drama or a play.

Course aims

- To develop ideas and scripts for screen and performance media;
- To develop techniques and skills in writing for screen and stage;
- To understand the relationship between script writing and its conditions of creation and production by learning from industry leaders;
- To understand the writer's role in different sites and contexts of creative production;
- To understand historical debates and ideas underpinning the practices of script writing;
- To explore the connection between writing and performance in film, TV and theatre.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

You will learn through a combination of writing workshops, seminars, lectures, guest visits by industry professionals, screenings and performance visits, independent learning tasks and assessments.

How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment.

- Script development and writing (for film, TV, games and stage, depending on options and pathway)
- Portfolios
- Essays
- Presentations
- Final creative project

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

At the end of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of different forms, genres, traditions and theories of script writing and production in national, transnational, international contexts;
- 2. Evidence an understanding of the techniques and skills required for writing for different media;
- 3. Understand the relationship between conceptualising ideas and using practical formats to realise them:
- 4. Evidence an understanding of script writing as an artistic output underpinned by research;
- 5. Develop, critically analyse and contextualise scripts for different forms and media;
- 6. Analyse a creative brief and identify appropriate creative models;
- 7. Apply script writing techniques to the communication of ideas in specific formats;
- 8. Write complex scripts in the formats chosen;
- 9. Demonstrate understanding of the relationship between script writing, development, creative production and the culture industries;
- 10. Evidence an ability to work collectively and collaboratively in the production of research and artistic outputs.
- 11. Show a comprehensive understanding of different research techniques and methodologies appropriate to taught postgraduate study;
- 12. Demonstrate original and rigorous approaches to artistic practice and research;
- 13. Refine skills in critical and contextual analysis;
- 14. Participate in writing workshops to receive and offer constructive feedback from/to peers and your tutor.

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.
