¹⁴ Programme Rationale & Aims

BA Theatre Studies and English at Birkbeck is highly distinctive: it is the only part-time and evening joint honours course in theatre and English at undergraduate level in central London. In its embrace of theatre and literature, it makes use of the rich context of Birkbeck's position in Bloomsbury, in London's West End. The programme enables students to study theatre and English in their fullest contexts and aspects, examining histories, cultural and national contexts, aesthetics, politics and traditions. The programme's close interrogation of theatre, drama, performance and literatures from the medieval period to the contemporary enables students to access rich intellectual and cultural histories, and to make fruitful connections across both disciplines. It explores the research and conceptual thinking that underlies the making of theatre, and it engages with the broad spectrum of theatre languages, histories and contexts, encompassing questions of space, the body, technology, scenography, documentation, devising, politics and identity. It gives the analysis of live performance a central place in the curriculum, and draws on theatre artists, critics and funders as guest speakers for the programme.

¹⁵ Entry Criteria

UCAS tariff: 112-128 points, A-levels: BBC-ABB

Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Learning and teaching on BA Theatre Studies and English makes use of a mix of techniques and strategies, including:

- Lectures
- Seminars
- Practice-based workshops and rehearsals
- Tutorial support and theory and practice-based supervision for the final year project
- Independent visits to theatrical performances
- Independent study and research
- Group-based study and research
- Access to public events hosted by the Birkbeck Centre for Contemporary Theatre.

Students will be taught primarily through the three key pedagogical practices central to Theatre Studies at BA level: lectures, seminar discussions and group workshops. Workshops will function to enable students to explore the concepts they are introduced to in seminars and lectures through practice. Practical approaches function to illuminate concepts, theories and modalities of performance. Students are assessed on their reflective and analytical engagement with the concepts they have explored. This process of learning is supplemented by independent research, independent group work and theatre visits.

Assessment methods include:

- Research essays
- Research exercises
- Group presentations
- Performance presentations
- Group vivas
- Individual vivas
- Written portfolios
- Exams (take-away and unseen)

18 | Programme Description

BA Theatre and English Studies is structured around a 'spine' of core modules which combine teaching, elements of practice, and independent research. All students take Theatre Languages (level 4), Theories of Theatricality and Performance (level 5) and Theatre in London Now (levels 4-6), a series of modules offering essential training in performance analysis, theatre and performance history, cultural theory, and research methods. Attention to London's theatre culture and visits to performance works are an intrinsic part of the curriculum. These aspects are examined year-on-year in reference to three themes: 'history', 'space' and 'communities'. In the final year, students are invited to identify their own research interest, to be pursued through the realisation of a written dissertation and final Theatre in London Now project, supported by a personal tutor. In English, compulsory



modules – for example, Writing London (level 4) and the Novel (level 5) or Aspects of Medieval and Renaissance Literature (level 5) – extend and enhance this work, and, as the course progresses, students are invited to choose modules from a range of options within Theatre Studies and English. The programme thus offers close and careful investigation of theatre and English in all its aspects - characteristic of Birkbeck's emphasis on interdisciplinary enquiry at all levels.
