16 Learning Outcomes

Subject Specific

- 1) Students will be able to describe and apply basic concepts, debates and perspectives relevant to historical and/or archaeological study, and engage with a range of critical vocabularies needed to facilitate the study of specific subjects.
- 2) Describe the distinctive features of approaches to study in history and archaeology, and consider the value of interdisciplinary perspectives.
- 3) Identify how subject specific and interdisciplinary knowledge can be applied to explore the characteristics of different cultures and societies in the past.

- 4) Critically analyse, evaluate and compare primary and secondary sources in each of the subject areas
- 5) Evaluate the similarities and differences between approaches to study in the individual disciplines.
- 6) Tackle written assignments with confidence using a critical and analytical approach, and construct coherent and well structured arguments in oral and written forms
- 7) Formulate simple research questions, and identify sub tasks within a problem solving task, whilst identifying and accessing relevant information sources.


- 8) Employ time management strategies to enable them to balance the demands of study with other aspects of their lives.

17 | Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Most modules on the Certificate are taught via a mixture of lecture and seminar, though some involve also a measure of practical work on archaeological materials, or fieldwork. On-line resources are used where appropriate. Assessment is normally via written coursework assignments only.





Programme Description

The programme provides free choice among available Certificate level 4 modules. Any mixture of topics is permitted, from the modules provided in relation to History, Archaeology, and Egyptology. Students must accumulate 120 credits to complete the Certificate.
