¹⁴ Programme Rationale & Aims

MA Classical Civilisation

This programme provides students with a structured masters programme in Classical Civilisation. It provides a framework within which preparation for doctoral study can be undertaken, for those who wish to progress to a research degree in selected areas; but is focussed particularly on provision of a rich and varied experience of studying classical civilisation at level 7. Teaching is research-led, delivered by core staff.

MA Classics:

This programme provides students with a structured masters programme in Classics, including at least one module of ancient language/literature at a very advanced level. It provides a framework within which preparation for doctoral study can be undertaken, for those who wish to progress to a research degree; but is focussed particularly on provision of a rich and varied experience of studying classical literature and culture at level 7. Teaching is research-led, delivered by core staff

16 Learning Outcomes

Subject Specific:

- 1. an awareness of contemporary practice in a range of the subdisciplines of Classics/Ancient History
- 2. an understanding of the methodologies used in the analysis and interpretation of ancient texts and other forms of source material where appropriate
- 3. to use ancient sources to form interpretations about past societies (MA Classical Civilisation)

or

- 3. the ability to understand complex texts in Latin and/or ancient Greek (MA Classics)
- 4. to understand core debates within specific subject fields

17 Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Learning is achieved through a balance of formal pedagogy and independent study, with an emphasis upon the latter, suitable to this level of study in a humanities subject. Teaching is done primarily via seminar group, with occasional lectures; and in one-to-one tutorials as and when necessary. Where appropriate, use is made of on-line resources including Moodle.

Assessment is via written work, with a different essay for each module, and a substantial dissertation.

18 | Programme Description

The programme consists of three taught modules and a dissertation. All students take the core module 'Introduction to Classical culture' in the first two terms of their degree. They then have a choice of a further two option modules (taken across two years for the part-time degree, or within one year for the full-time degree).

Students on the *MA Classics* must take a 'set book' option (in either Latin or ancient Greek).

There is also skills training in preparation for the dissertation in the first part of the summer term; students received one-to-one supervision for their dissertation research, and the dissertation is then submitted at the end of September in the year in which the degree is completed.
