14	Programme Rationale & Aims
	<p>The School aims to provide education in criminology and criminal justice that is critical, questioning and creative. It is designed for students from a range of different backgrounds. It seeks to produce undergraduates who not only have a knowledge of the relevant skills, rules and principles applicable to the study of criminology and criminal justice but also to ensure they are aware of the major theories from the human sciences to enable them to understand the social, political, economic, theoretical and cultural contexts of all aspects of crime, security and responses to crime and social order. Other main aims and distinctive features include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The imparting of advanced knowledge about concepts and debates across the key areas of the discipline of criminology and criminal justice and clear indications of how these are informed by multi-disciplinary research at the boundaries of knowledge; • Training in a range of specialist subject specific and transferable skills which prepare students for employment or further postgraduate study; • The possibility of study in full time or part time face to face mode; and • Provision of a degree programme which is sensitive to the particular needs of mature and part time students. • A degree programme that facilitates transition from pre degree to undergraduate degree programmes with due recognition being given for prior learning. • To better integrate and utilise the School's expertise and international reputation in these disciplines into the School suite of programmes.

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A comprehensive grounding in the major concepts, principles, policies and methods relevant to criminology and criminal justice. In particular students will have an appreciation of how they are informed by research at the forefront of the discipline and competing intellectual approaches within criminological and criminal justice studies and relates disciplines in the human sciences; 2. An ability to place criminological and criminal justice studies, policies and institutional practices in their historical, ethical, social, political, cultural and economic context. In particular we aim to encourage students to interrogate the interface between the theory and practice of criminology and criminal justice; 3. A mature appreciation of social scientific methods which can be used to identify, locate and analyse scholarly, policy and practical developments in the field; 4. An advanced understanding of multi-disciplinary approaches to the study of crime and criminal justice which enables students to demonstrate a critical awareness and an ability to make use of theoretical and methodological frameworks developed in law, the humanities and social sciences; 5. The ability to deal with complex issues systematically and creatively; 6. Confidence in a range of subject specific and transferable skills which can prepare them for employment or further studies. These include skills in writing and problem solving, IT literacy, group work, independent research, analysis and critique, oral presentation, independent research, critique, and problem solving; and 7. The ability to exercise sound academic judgement, take personal responsibility for their course of study and demonstrate initiative.
17	Learning, teaching and assessment methods
	<p>The School of Law employs a variety of teaching and learning strategies to enable learning outcomes to be achieved. In particular we promote student learning through lectures; seminars; virtual learning environments; student led study groups facilitated by the school; private tutorials; web based independent skills tutorials; weekend and pre-sessional skills workshops; public lectures and research seminars. We employ a diversity of assessment tools including independent research essays, seen and unseen exams, group work, oral presentations, reflective journals and creative and critical thinking exercises.</p>
