LLM QLD (Qualifying Law Degree)):

- LLM in International Economic Law Justice and Development
- LLM/MA in Human Rights
- LLM/MA in Criminal Law & Criminal Justice
- LLM in Constitutional Law, Politics and Theory

In addition, should students wish to intensify their research skills, they may take one of their options as a Research Project (10,000-15,000 words). In such cases students will be appointed a supervisor. In all cases, students will be appointed an academic advisor to



guide them in their choice of options.

In common with its current LLM/MA provision the LLM aims to provide a comprehensive postgraduate education in law, which – at the same time – furnishes a solid qualifying base for further postgraduate study (MPhil/PhD). Students will be taught in small groups in courses founded within the research-led teaching ethos of the School (staff present their latest research). Students are expected to engage fully in such courses, preparing materials and giving presentations/engaging in discussion.

Assessment – an essay of 4,000-5,000 words per option – is designed to encourage students to further develop research skills, accessing additional materials in the area of study and summarising their research results in a clear and comprehensive manner. Where the Research Project element is chosen, students will be required to demonstrate

independent research skills and high levels of research presentation.
