14	<b>Programme Rationale &amp; Aims</b>	<p>The BA Linguistics and Culture degree is aimed at students who want to learn about linguistics in conjunction with the study of culture.</p> <p>The programme offers full-time, evening, face-to-face study, combining the study of linguistics with the study of language and culture. Students can choose to study a language (French, German, Italian, Japanese, or Spanish) and/or they can study the associated culture(s) in order to acquire advanced knowledge of a range of comparative cultural topics (e.g. literature, thought and cinema).</p> <p>In the linguistics component of the programme, you learn about the structure and functions of language, and study the linguistic ideas and theories which enable us to model and analyse how language is patterned and how it is used.</p> <p>Specifically, you will study the major areas of linguistics and learn how each of these areas enables us to understand how language is structured, and how people use language to communicate meanings, as well as information about themselves and their identity. By studying linguistics, you can develop a scientific, critical approach to thinking about how language works, and how it functions within society.</p>					

	<p>A unique feature of the programme is that you study aspects of Applied Linguistics – the application of linguistic methods to problems in real-world contexts. These aspects of linguistics are not normally taught as part of undergraduate degrees in linguistics.</p> <p><b>BA Linguistics and Culture with Foundation Year</b></p> <p>For the BA Linguistics and Culture with Foundation Year programme, the purpose is to prepare students for successful completion of their undergraduate degree. The Foundation Year provides students the opportunity to build on their study skills in the social sciences. The subsequent years of the ‘with foundation year’ programme are the same as the 3-year full-time or 4 year part-time BA Linguistics and Culture programme. Students who successfully complete the programme with foundation year are awarded the same BA Linguistics and Culture degree title as awarded on the 3-year full-time and 4-year part-time routes.</p>
15	<p><b>Entry Criteria</b></p> <p>UCAS tariff score: 104-120. The UCAS tariff score is applicable if applicants have recently studied a qualification that has a UCAS tariff equivalence</p> <p>Non-standard qualifications are considered.</p> <p>Credits from other undergraduate courses may be accepted.</p> <p>A language placement test will be required for any students who wish to study at a higher level than beginners in their chosen language.</p> <p><b>BA Linguistics and Culture with Foundation Year</b></p> <p>This programme is designed for people who can demonstrate the ability and motivation to complete the BA Linguistics and Culture but who do not currently meet the entry criteria for direct entrance onto the degree. Applications will often be invited for interview to discuss their interests and future plans, and to assess their needs and aptitudes. For those students who already have Level 3 qualifications the expectation is that they will have qualifications with a UCAS tariff equivalence of 48. Given that students on the foundation year will be enrolled on degree programmes, applicants will be offered a place only if there is significant evidence to suggest they have the ability to complete the full degree.</p>
16	<p><b>Learning Outcomes</b></p> <p><b>For Foundation Year</b></p> <p>Students will have acquired:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. A foundational understanding of some of the different disciplines offered by the School of Social Science, History and Philosophy.</li> <li>2. A foundational understanding of some key concepts in those disciplines.</li> <li>3. Key academic reading, writing, research and assessment skills appropriate to the study of those disciplines</li> </ol>

	<p>4. An understanding of other key learning skills required for university-level study and knowledge of how to access support at Birkbeck to develop these.</p> <p><b>For all modes of study:</b></p> <p>On this programme students will learn to understand key concepts in modern linguistics and to apply them to analysing how language is used.</p> <p>Students will also develop a critical understanding of human language, and what makes it unique among communication systems.</p> <p>Students will learn how to construct and evaluate linguistic arguments, and to compare and evaluate different ways of analysing data, and the nature and limitations of the various theoretical frameworks which have been proposed to explain language.</p> <p>At the same time, students will study a range of topics within the study of Culture, to develop an understanding of the relationships between various forms of Cultural practice and cultural products, and their impact on the world.</p> <p>Studying linguistics develops a number of skills, including reasoning skills, abstract thinking, being able to critique and evaluate ideas, synthesise information from different sources, and problem-solving.</p> <p>Linguistics also helps to develop the ability to construct and evaluate models, and explore the relationships between theories and the phenomena that theories are designed to explain.</p> <p>In addition to these skills, students will also enhance their verbal and written expression, communication skills, and more generic skills such as managing time and information technology skills.</p> <p>Studying for this degree also helps to develop personal and social skills, self-expression, ability to participate and contribute to group-work and discussions, and planning and presenting.</p>
17	<p><b>Learning, teaching and assessment methods</b></p>
	<p>Teaching takes several forms, including lectures, seminars, discussions and presentations.</p> <p>The Linguistics subjects in your degree are assessed entirely by your coursework, mainly in the form of essays. The language components are also assessed by written work, as well as by unseen exams.</p>
18	<p><b>Programme Description</b></p>

There are three core level modules:</p> <p>1. Fundamentals of Study: Learning through the Global City</p>

	<p>2. Breaking Boundaries of Knowledge</p> <p>3. Crossing Borders: Studying in SSHP</p> <p>For the final module students can either take</p> <p>Contemporary Global Issues: Approaches in Social Science, History and Philosophy (level 3) or they can select a language option (level 4 -see list in programme structure below).</p> <p>Students who successfully pass all modules with grades of 40% or higher may progress onto Year one of BA Linguistics and Culture with Foundation Year.</p>
