14	Programme Rationale & Aims
	The BA Linguistics and Language degree is aimed at students who want to learn about linguistics at the same time as acquiring a high level of competence in a modern language.



The programme offers full-time, evening, face-to-face study, combining the study of a modern foreign language and linguistics to a high level.

The aim of the languages component of the programmes is to allow students to reach a high level of competence in a modern foreign language (French, German, Italian, Japanese, or Spanish) over three or fouryears; to study the associated culture(s) of the language and to acquire advanced knowledge of a range of comparative cultural topics.

The linguistics component is aimed at students who want to learn about linguistics at the same time as acquiring a high level of competence in a modern language.

On this programme you learn about the structure and functions of language, and study the linguistic ideas and theories which enable us to model and analyse how language is patterned and how it is used. Specifically, you will study the major areas of linguistic, and learn how each of these areas enables us to understand how language is structured, and how people use language to communicate meanings, as well as information about themselves and their identity.

By studying linguistics, you can develop a scientific, critical approach to thinking about how language works, and how it functions within society. A unique feature of the BA LL is that you study aspects of Applied Linguistics – the application of linguistic methods to problems in real-world contexts. These aspects of linguistics are not normally taught as part of undergraduate degrees in linguistics.

BA Linguistics and Language with Foundation Year

For the BA Linguistics and Language with Foundation Year programme, the purpose is to prepare students for successful completion of their undergraduate degree. The Foundation Year (one year FT or two years PT) provides students the opportunity to explore their interests and build on their study skills, and on successful completion of the Foundation Year, students may progress onto year one of the PT of FT programmes. The curriculum for the 'with foundation year' programme after the completion of the foundation year modules is the same as the full-time or part-time BA programme. Students who successfully complete the versions of the degree programme 'with foundation year' are awarded the same final degree title as students on the full-time or part-time degree routes.

¹⁵ Entry Criteria

UCAS tariff: 104-120 points. The UCAS tariff score is applicable to students who have recently studied a qualification that has a UCAS tariff equivalence.

Non-standard qualifications considered.

Credits from other undergraduate courses may be accepted.

A language placement test will be required for any students who wish to study at a higher level than beginners in their chosen language.

BA Linguistics and Language with Foundation Year

UCAS tariff: 48. The UCAS tariff score is applicable to students who have recently studied a qualification that has a UCAS tariff equivalence

This programme is designed for people who can demonstrate the ability and motivation to complete the BA Linguistics and Language but who do not currently meet the entry criteria for direct entrance onto the degree. Applicants will often be invited for interview to discuss their interests and future



plans, and to assess their needs and aptitudes. For those students who already have Level 3 qualifications the expectation is that they will have qualifications with a UCAS tariff equivalence of 48. Given that students on the foundation year will be enrolled on degree programmes, applicants will be offered a place only if there is significant evidence to suggest they have the ability to complete the full degree.

16 Learning Outcomes

For the Foundation Year:

Students will have acquired:

- 1. A foundational understanding of the different disciplines offered by the School of Social Science, History and Philosophy
- 2. A foundational understanding of some key concepts in those disciplines
- 3. Key academic reading, writing, research and assessment skills appropriate to the study of those disciplines
- 4. An understanding of other key learning skills required for university-level study and knowledge of how to access support at Birkbeck to develop these.

For all modes of study:

On this programme you will learn to understand key concepts in modern linguistics and to apply them to analysing how language is used.

You will also develop a critical understanding of human language, and what makes it unique among communication systems.

You will learn how to construct and evaluate linguistic arguments, and to compare and evaluate different ways of analysing data, and the nature and limitations of the various theoretical frameworks which have been proposed to explain language.

At the same time, you will develop degree-level competence in one modern language, and familiarity with the cultural, literary and social aspects of that language

Studying linguistics develops a number of skills, including reasoning skills, abstract thinking, being able to critique and evaluate ideas, synthesise information from different sources, and problem solving. Linguistics also helps to develop the ability to construct and evaluate models, and explore the relationships between theories and the phenomena that theories are designed to explain.

In addition to these skills, you will also enhance your verbal and written expression, communication skills, and more generic skills such as managing time and information technology skills.

Studying for this degree also helps to develop your personal and social skills, self-expression, ability to participate in and contribute to group-work and discussions, and planning and presenting.

17 Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Teaching takes several forms, including lectures, seminars, discussions and presentations.

The Linguistics subjects in your degree are assessed entirely by your coursework, mainly in the form of essays. The language components are also assessed by written work, as well as by unseen exams.



18 Programme Structure

The programme comprises 360 credits, of which 150 must be taken in linguistics.

You take five core linguistics modules - Approaches to Study, Approaches to Language, Analysing Language Structure and Use, Investigating Language, and you complete a linguistics project in your final year. There are additional optional modules to choose from in linguistics.

You will also follow one of five language pathways: French, German, Italian, Japanese or Spanish. These may be taken from beginners' level or a more advanced level, depending on your level of attainment. Starting at beginners' or near-beginners' level, you will attain a language level equivalent to at least one year's study beyond A-level. With the higher levels of entry, the aim is to raise your language level to upper-intermediate or near-native standard. Remaining modules may be chosen from those relating to the culture of the language studied (many taught primarily in that language), or from a range of cross-cultural modules (mainly taught in English).

Your programme will be designed to suit your interests and your language capability, which, for most languages, can be at any level from beginners' to native speaker proficiency. The sample programme below will help give you a better idea of the structure you would be following, but please bear in mind that other languages and pathways are available.

BA Linguistics and Language with Foundation year

Students in the BA Intercultural Communication with Foundation year take either 120 credits at Level 3, or 90 credits at level 3 and a level 4 language option. There are three core level modules:

- 1. Fundamentals of Study: Learning through the Global City
- 2. Breaking Boundaries of Knowledge
- 3. Crossing Borders: Studying in SSHP
- 4. For the final module students take:
 - a language option (level 4 -see list in programme structure below)
 - **OR**, if they have been assessed by the department as already having an appropriate language level and experience to enable progression to year one of the degree, they have the option to take:
 - Contemporary Global Issues: Approaches in Social Science, History and Philosophy (level 3)

Students who successfully pass all modules with grades of 40% or higher may progress onto Year one of BA Linguistics and Language with Foundation Year.

Programme Specific Regulations

The title of the degree awarded is determined by the exit level of the language studied and the number of credits studied in the language area (which can include relevant culture modules). Students who achieve language level 3 and study at least 90 credits in the chosen language area will be eligible to obtain the BA (Hons) Linguistics with Language degree title. Students who reach a higher level of language, and complete 150 credits in modules related to their chosen language will be awarded the BA (Hons) Linguistics and Language.

The same rule will apply for those completing the BA Linguistics and Language with International Experience.

Those students who do not reach the language exit level of at least 3 will not meet the above criteria and will achieve a BA (Hons) Linguistics and Culture award on the completion of their degree. To be awarded this title, students must study at least 90 credits of their 360 credits in culture/language modules, as well as 150 credits in linguistics modules.

Principle
