### <sup>14</sup> **Programme Rationale & Aims**

### **BA Global Politics and International Relations:**

This programme aims to provide students with the main theoretical, conceptual and empirical skills required for understanding and explaining contemporary global politics and international relations. Its compulsory modules focus on: the history of the state and the international system, the contemporary international political and economic system, the major theories of global politics and international relations, and the relationship between war and global social relations. In line with the interdisciplinary nature of the Department of Politics, the programme draws on a wide range of resources from political theory and philosophy, political science, and the traditions of political and historical sociology.

### BA Global Politics and International Relations with Foundation Year

For the BA Global Politics and International Relations with Foundation Year programme, the purpose of the Foundation Year is to prepare students for successful completion of their

undergraduate degree. The Foundation Year (one year FT or two years PT) provides students the opportunity to explore their interests and build on their study skills, and on successful completion of the Foundation Year, students may progress onto year one of the PT of FT programmes. The curriculum for the 'with foundation year' programme after the completion of the foundation year modules is the same as the full-time or part-time BA programme. Students who successfully complete the versions of the degree programme 'with foundation year' are awarded the same final degree title as students on the full-time or part-time degree routes.

15	Entry Criteria
	Students who have recently taken A-level qualifications will require 1 A and 2 B's at A-Level (or UCAS tariff points 120 - 128). Students who fail to achieve these grades may still be considered for entry if they demonstrate the required level of intellectual commitment and potential.
	Birkbeck welcomes applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements or consider alternative qualifications based on judgement of academic potential.
	<b>BA Global Politics and International Relations with Foundation Year:</b> This programme is designed for people who can demonstrate the ability and motivation to complete the <b>BA Global Politics and International Relations</b> but who do not currently meet the entry criteria for direct entrance onto the degree. Applicants will often be invited for interview to discuss their interests and future plans, and to assess their needs and aptitudes. For those students who already have Level 3 qualifications the expectation is that they will have qualifications equivalent to 48 UCAS tariff points. Given that students on the foundation year will be enrolled on degree programmes, applicants will be offered a place only if there is significant evidence to suggest they have the ability to complete the full degree.

On successful completion of this programme a student will be expected to:

- understand and employ the main concepts and theories used in the analysis of global politics, globalisation and international relations;

- critically examine arguments concerning the nature of the 'global' and the 'international' and the relationship between the two;

- understand the major transformations that have taken place in the international political and economic system in the modern period, and evaluate various explanations of these transformations;

- understand and critically assess the relationship between the state and the international system, as well as the role played by war in international politics;

- demonstrate a clear awareness of the importance of the relationship between theory and empirical evidence in the study of politics;

- demonstrate proficiency in the employment of key analytical skills in the study of politics;

- use the skills developed in the programme for vocational and personal purposes, and potentially in further academic study.

## <sup>17</sup> Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Teaching takes place in lectures and seminars. In seminars, a variety of methods are employed to engage students, including student presentations (individual and group), small group discussions, debates and so on. Lectures are supported by a detailed coursebook for each module that indicates relevant reading and guides further private study. Web-based resources are used to facilitate access to reading and other course materials.

Assessment is through coursework (essays) and examinations. Essays are compulsory, but essay marks only count towards the final module mark if they improve the exam mark. This means that essays can be treated as formative exercises, enabling students to obtain feedback but not jeopardising their opportunity to get a good result for the module in the exam. Written feedback on essays is provided within three weeks of submission, and students have the opportunity to clarify any feedback by contacting their lecturers and seminar leaders.

# Programme Description Foundation Year: Students in the BA Global Politics and International Relations with Foundation year take 120 credits at Level 3 in the foundation year(s). There are four core modules: Fundamentals of Study: Learning through the Global City Breaking Boundaries of Knowledge Crossing Borders: Studying in SSHP Contemporary Global Issues: Approaches in Social Science, History and Philosophy Students who successfully pass all modules with grades of 40% or higher may progress onto Year one of BA Global Politics and International Relations with Foundation Year.

### BA Global Politics and International Relations:

Students take four level 4 modules that ensure that they have an introductory grasp of the degree content and are equipped with the general knowledge and skills required for an honours degree. Results from these modules do not count in determining the final degree classification. Compulsory modules at levels 5 and 6 address the central subjects of international political economy, theories of international relations, and the relationship between war, political power and societal structures. Options cover a wide range of subjects relevant to the degree programme, including modules that offer further insight into various

facets of political economy and international relations (e.g., Capitalism, Empire, Nationalism, Ethnicity and Religious Conflict, International Migration and Transnationalism, Food, Politics and Society) or provide a specific focus on parts of the world that are important for global politics (e.g. Politics and the Middle East, American Politics and Foreign Policy).
