Programme Rationale & Aims

BA Politics:

The BA Politics equips students with the tools to understand the nature of Politics in the modern world. It is taught with an emphasis on the interdisciplinary nature of the study of politics, drawing on history, sociology, economics, anthropology, human geography and psychology as well as politics. It also recognises the close connection between theoretical and empirical approaches, rejecting the artificial distinction that is often made between political theory and political science.

Students are provided with a strong grounding in British politics in years 1 and 2, but from the beginning are encouraged to think about Politics in comparative and international perspective. There is also a stress on the idea of politics as a practice, an activity engaged in not just by politicians, but by many different kinds of actors and institutions in modern societies.

BA Politics with Foundation Year:

For the BA Politics with Foundation Year programme, the purpose of the Foundation Year is to prepare students for successful completion of their undergraduate degree. The Foundation Year provides students the opportunity to explore their interests and build on their study skills, and on successful completion of the Foundation Year, students may progress onto year one of the programme. The final three years (full-time) or 4 years (part-



time) of the 'with foundation year' programme route is the same as the 3 or 4 year BA programmes and students who successfully complete a degree programme with foundation year are awarded the same final degree title as students on the other BA degree routes.

¹⁵ Entry Criteria

The UCAS tariff is set at 120-128 points. The UCAS tariff score is applicable if students have recently studied a qualification that has a UCAS tariff equivalence. Students who fail to achieve this level may still be considered for entry if they demonstrate the required level of intellectual commitment and potential.

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

BA Politics with Foundation Year

This programme is designed for people who can demonstrate the ability and motivation to complete the BA Politics but who do not currently meet the entry criteria for direct entrance onto the degree. Applicants will often be invited for interview to discuss their interests and future plans, and to assess their needs and aptitudes. For those students who already have Level 3 qualifications the expectation is that they will have qualifications equivalent to 48 UCAS tariff points. Given that students on the foundation year will be enrolled on degree programmes, applicants will be offered a place only if there is significant evidence to suggest they have the ability to complete the full degree.

Learning Outcomes

Foundation Year:

Students will have acquired:

- 1. A foundational understanding of the different disciplines offered by the School of Social Science, History and Philosophy
- 2. A foundational understanding of some key concepts in those disciplines
- 3. Key academic reading, writing, research and assessment skills appropriate to the study of those disciplines
- 4. An understanding of other key learning skills required for university-level study and knowledge of how to access support at Birkbeck to develop these.

All modes of study:

On successful completion of this programme a student will be expected to be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of politics in a number of different societies,
- Employ comparative analysis in the study of political institutions and practices across different societies and regions.
- Demonstrate a developed knowledge of various theories of politics drawn from political science, political theory and other disciplines in the social sciences.
- Recognise the importance of political practice and how this shapes and is shaped by large scale political institutions and processes.
- Demonstrate developed skills of enquiry and analysis in politics and social science.



- Demonstrate a capacity to communicate clearly ideas and arguments about politics both orally and in writing.
- Where appropriate, employ skills developed in the course of study in public and vocational settings.

Learning, teaching and assessment methods

Various teaching and learning methods are used on the degree. Most teaching takes place in lectures and seminars, employing a variety of methods such as small group work, student presentations, debates, guest speakers and so on. Other forms of teaching are used where appropriate, including field-trips, the use of film, etc. In line with other teaching in the Department, extensive use is made of audio-visual facilities and web-based learning tools such as Moodle.

A mix of assessment strategies is used. Level 4 modules employ a combination of short essays and in-class tests. Assessment at levels 5 and 6 is through coursework (essays), small-scale assessment tests (for example, political blogging, writing policy briefs) and examinations. Where essays are used they are compulsory, but essay marks only count towards the final module mark if they improve on the exam mark. This means that essays can be treated as formative exercises, enabling students to obtain feedback but not jeopardising their opportunity to get a good result for the module in the exam. Written feedback on essays is provided within three weeks of submission, and students have the opportunity to clarify any feedback by contacting their lecturers and seminar leaders.

Programme Structure

BA Politics:

Students take four level 4 modules, two in the first year and two in the second on the full-time version of the programme. These ensure that they have an introductory grasp of the degree content and are equipped with the general knowledge and skills required for an honours degree in Politics. Compulsory level 5 modules cover the subjects of British and comparative political institutions and applied politics, while the level 6 core module in Social and Political Theory ensures that graduates have achieved a high level of training in the theoretical bases of political science. Options enable students to pursue particular interests related to Politics, including the application of theory to topical issues (Challenges in Contemporary Politics), the in-depth study of countries' and regions' political systems (American Politics and Foreign Policy, Comparative European Politics), and political economy and social policy (Capitalism, Social Relations and Social Policy).

BA Politics with Foundation Year:

Students in the BA Politics with Foundation year take 120 credits at Level 3 in the foundation year(s). There are four core modules:


- 1. Fundamentals of Study: Learning through the Global City
- 2. Breaking Boundaries of Knowledge
- 3. Crossing Borders: Studying in SSHP
- 4. Contemporary Global Issues: Approaches in Social Science, History and Philosophy





Students who successfully pass all modules with grades of 40% or higher may **progress** onto Year one of BA Politics with Foundation Year (which is the same as the routes without foundation years.)
