14 Programme Rationale & Aims

Questions surrounding climate change, resource wars, violent conflict and population growth are likely to remain central to contemporary global politics in the decades ahead. This programme offers an evening study degree that combines critical social theory and detailed empirical analysis in the explanation of contemporary global environmental politics and policy. It draws from research and teaching expertise across the Departments of Politics, and Geography, Environment and Development Studies (GEDS) to deliver an ambitious curriculum addressing conceptual issues of global scarcity, violence, demographic change and environmental crisis together with the more concrete examination of key areas in contemporary environmental policy and law. The programme core modules are taught by faculty who are research active in areas of demographic politics, gender studies, critical geopolitics, food security and International environmental policy and governance.

Students taking this programme will:

- develop skills and engage with materials needed to understand the trajectories of current demographic and environmental change, and to appreciate the tensions and contradictions they generate in the geopolitical realm through the relationships between and across states and regions.
- learn about the principles, instruments and ethics of international environmental policy, governance and legislation.
- acquire detailed knowledge of environmental policies in relation to natural environment, water, waste, energy, low carbon, and resources on a local, national, regional and global scale.
- undertake specific case studies of geopolitical, population and environmental occurrences and debates in particular countries or regions.



 critically explore key theories and concepts employed in political theory, environmental studies, political geography, global political economy, international relations, sociology and gender studies when explaining and understanding global environmental politics and policy.
