14 Programme Rationale & Aims

Information on this programme specification refers to the Foundation Year (year zero) only. For information about the main degrees (years one to three full-time), please refer to the individual specifications for the programmes listed above.

Foundation Year Rationale and Aims

To provide support to those students who do not meet the formal entrance requirements for direct entrance onto the degree (but who can demonstrate the ability to complete the degree) in order to provide them with a grounding in one or more disciplinary areas in the Arts and Humanities and help them develop the foundational skills and knowledge required for successful completion of the degree.

15 Entry Criteria

A-Levels: usually DD or equivalent. Applications from students with non-standard qualifications are also welcomed. Acceptance may be subject to an admissions test and/or interview.

16 Learning Outcomes

Students will have acquired:

- 1. A foundational understanding of some of the different disciplinary areas that make up Arts and Humanities.
- 2. More detailed knowledge of key concepts in one or more of these.
- 3. If appropriate, beginners to lower intermediate level language skills in one of five languages.



4. Key academic reading, writing, research and assessment skills appropriate to the study of Arts and the Humanities.

17 Learning, teaching and assessment methods

A number of interactive lectures for large groups. Otherwise teaching will take place in smaller seminar and workshop groups that support the development of knowledge, skills, confidence and self-awareness.

18 | Programme Description

The Foundation Year is designed to provide a broad-based introduction for students who wish to study an Arts and/or Humanities subject before allowing them to continue their studies in these areas in more depth or to specialize in a specific field of study. In the first year (or first two years on the part-time programme) they will improve academic study and research skills in the core modules 'Fundamentals of Study: Learning Through the Global City' and 'Breaking Boundaries of Knowledge'. They will take one further core module, 'The Arts: Perspectives and Possibilities', which will introduce them to key ideas, concepts and methods in the Arts and Humanities and one option module, either 'The Arts: Questioning the Contemporary World', allowing them to deepen your understanding of the Arts and Humanities, or one of five language modules at beginners or advanced beginners levels (French, German, Italian, Japanese or Spanish). After the Foundation Year they can either continue to study a broad range of Arts and Humanities topics in increasingly indepth ways on the BA Liberal Arts or specialize in a particular field by continuing their studies on one of the degrees in the Departments of Cultures and Languages, English, Theatre and Creative Writing, Film, Media and Cultural Studies, History of Art (see programme list above).
