	<p>The programme consists of lectures and seminars for taught modules, along with a dissertation. In the Quantitative methods modules, assessment is based on a research project submitted during the year and a final exam. In the other modules, assessment is by coursework.</p>

18	Programme Description
	<p>This is an interdisciplinary social science training programme designed to prepare students for further research in the workplace or for MPhil/PhD study. The programme covers key topics in criminology, quantitative and qualitative methods. All students also carry out an independent dissertation, putting into practice the methods and theoretical concepts they have been taught. The programme provides a particularly strong environment for theoretically informed, interdisciplinary and socially engaged research.</p> <p>Students take two compulsory modules (60 credits), two optional modules in Criminology (60 credits), and write a 60 credit dissertation. Full-time students take all four taught modules Oct-May and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept. Part-time students take two modules each year and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept of their second year.</p>
