¹⁷ Learning, teaching and assessment methods

The programme consists of lectures, seminars and computer workshops. In the Quantitative methods module, assessment is based on a research project submitted during the year and a final exam. In the other modules, assessment is by coursework.

¹⁸ **Programme Description**

This is an interdisciplinary social science training programme designed to prepare students for further research in the workplace. The programme covers ontology, epistemology, quantitative and qualitative techniques, and advanced methods masterclasses. Students who do the full MA also carry out an independent dissertation, putting into practice the methods and theoretical concepts they have been taught. The programme provides a particularly strong environment for theoretically informed, interdisciplinary and socially engaged research.

Students take four compulsory modules (120 credits). Full-time students take all four taught modules Oct-May. Part-time students take two modules each year.
