14	<b>Programme Rationale &amp; Aims</b>
	<p>This programme meets the latent demand in the UK for an interdisciplinary graduate programme in politics, philosophy and economics, subjects that naturally overlap and complement each other. There are very few such programmes in the UK, and none available through the part-time mode through evening instruction.</p> <p><b>Aims:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Students will receive a high-quality education in all three of the component subjects;</li> <li>• Students will get a good understanding of the central principles of economics via the newly created core economics module;</li> <li>• Students will get a good understanding of politics and philosophy through doing Masters-level modules in each of those subjects;</li> <li>• Students will have the opportunity to specialise in any particular area from any of the three; subjects, via free choice of additional option modules and via free choice of dissertation topic.</li> </ul>

15	<b>Entry Criteria</b>
	A second-class honours degree (2:2) or above in any subject; prior exposure to at least one of the three component subjects would be a distinct advantage, but it might be possible for able students to acquire the relevant knowledge as part of this programme.

16	<b>Learning Outcomes</b>
	Students will receive a high-quality education in all three of the component subjects. They will get a good understanding of the central principles of economics via the newly created core

	<p>economics module; and good understanding of politics and philosophy through doing Masters-level modules in each of those subjects. Students will have the opportunity to specialise in any particular area from any of the three subjects, via free choice of additional option modules and via free choice of dissertation topic.</p> <p><b>Subject Specific</b></p> <p>To gain the MSc qualification the student will have demonstrated separately the skills specified in the learning outcomes for approved modules in the programme. These will ensure that they understand key principles and analytical constructs used in economics, philosophy and politics</p> <p><b>Intellectual</b></p> <p>The ability to think in a structured manner about issues in politics, philosophy and economics, and in the social sciences more generally.</p> <p><b>Personal and Social</b></p> <p>The ability to study independently, to learn from a wide range of sources including journal articles and the ability to transfer knowledge from one context to another.</p>
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17	<p><b>Learning, teaching and assessment methods</b></p> <p>The primary method of teaching is through lectures and guided reading, to outline the core material in each module, as well as a range of supplementary material available over Moodle. Students will supplement lectures with considerable amount of time on self study.</p> <p>Many modules would also have small-group seminars for interactive discussion and problem solving, which fosters enthusiasm in students, as well as enabling them to develop their own opinions and to learn from those of fellow students.</p> <p>One-to-one dissertation supervisions, enabling detailed and feedback on the student’s choice of topic, as well as intensive training in academic writing as they improve successive drafts.</p> <p>Assessment varies across modules, typically through essays, or exams supplemented with coursework assignments.</p>
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18	<p><b>Programme Description</b></p> <p>Students doing the course in part-time mode will in their first year do a 30-credit core course in Economics; and choose a total of 30 credits of options from Philosophy and/or Politics. They will also begin work on a 60-credit dissertation, which they will complete in the second year. Also in their second year they will choose further options from Philosophy and / or Politics so that they have at least 30 credits of options from each of the component subjects (Economics, Philosophy and Politics). To make up the total requirement of 180 credits, the last 30 credits will allow free choice from any of the three departments, and may include level 7 or level 6 courses to maximise choice.)</p>
