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| 14 | Programme Rationale & Aims |
| | <p>BA Theatre, Film and Media Studies enables students to engage with the intersections between theatre, performance and film. The programme is highly distinctive as the only provider of evening part-time and full-time study in theatre and film studies at undergraduate level in central London, putting the creative, historical and conceptual investigation of theatre and film in dialogue with one another as complementary areas of study. Students will encounter key disciplinary aspects of theatre and performance studies, theatre histories, theatre theory, and in-depth study of drama, theatre and performance as text and in performance. Elements of individual practice-based work in theatre and film are complemented by the option to make theatre collaboratively should students wish to do so. In tandem with these investigations, they will study film form, history and theory, engage in in-depth exploration of the history of the cinema industry from the late nineteenth century on, and encounter critical movements in film theory and international cinema. Each year, students will be invited to select an option module or modules to immerse themselves a particular area of interest, ranging across theatre, film and cultural studies. Themes of representation and the role of theatre and film in society are continuously addressed via an inclusive teaching practice that places student voice at the centre. The programme makes</p> |

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| | <p>use of the rich context of Birkbeck's position in Bloomsbury, in London's West End, by giving the analysis of live performance and cinema screenings a central place in the curriculum, and by engaging with guest speakers and practitioners. 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| | <p>On theatre studies modules, students will be taught primarily through the three key pedagogical practices central to the subject at BA level: lectures, seminar discussions and group workshops. Workshops will function to enable students to explore the concepts they are introduced to in seminars and lectures through practice. This enables students to take a 'laboratory' approach, where they hypothesise on an aspect of theatre, and test this hypothesis through practice. They are then assessed, not on their practical skills, but rather on their reflective and analytical engagement with the concepts they have explored. This process of learning will be supplemented by independent research, independent group work and theatre visits.</p> <p>On film and media studies modules, students will experience teaching styles which deliver a lecture and seminar together, a combination of presentation with student participation. Lectures take up a part of the class and then interactive discussion reinforces students' understanding of the subject of the lecture. This is achieved often through student analysis of film extracts and television programmes. Small group work is used and is designed to allow students to undertake focused tasks in a supportive environment so that they can develop their creative, analytical, communication and interpersonal skills. Discussion group work is designed to develop students' critical and analytical, presentation and communication skills. One-to-one tutorials develop student skills in presenting and discussing ideas verbally, and to engage in the construction of arguments through interaction with the tutor. 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| 18 | <p>Programme Description</p> <p>BA Theatre, Film and Media Studies builds students' skills and knowledges in theatre and screen media incrementally through a programme which offers training in key skills of interpretation, critical analysis, and creative practice. At level 4, students engage in theatre history, performance analysis, an introduction to cinema, and take an option module from a selection on offer in the School of Arts, including creative practice modules in theatre or screenwriting. At level 5, students develop more advanced knowledge in theatre and film theory, film history, and take an option module in theatre. At level 6, students develop their own dissertation or creative projects, self-led critical projects engaging with live performance, and two option modules from a selection on offer in the School of Arts.
