## <sup>14</sup> Programme Rationale & Aims

BA Theatre Studies and Arts Management distinctively enables students to engage comprehensively with theatre and performance with and alongside crucial themes in arts management. Birkbeck is the only provider of evening part-time and full-time study in theatre and arts management at undergraduate level in central London, and ideal for those seeking to develop their careers in the arts with and alongside their studies. The programme puts the creative, historical and conceptual investigation of theatre in dialogue with a detailed attention to how the creative industries function now. Students will encounter key disciplinary aspects of theatre and performance studies, theatre histories, theatre theory, and in-depth study of drama, theatre and performance as text and in performance. In tandem with these investigations, they will study organizational practices, cultural leadership, marketing, budgeting, creative labour, curating, and audience development and engagement, garnering a strong foundation in the material operations of the creative industries, and insights as to how to navigate that industrial context. Representation, the cultural politics of the arts, and the role of the arts in society are key themes to be addressed year on year via the programme's inclusive teaching practice. Each year, students will be invited to select an option module or modules to immerse themselves a particular area of interest, ranging across the arts, humanities, cultural studies, and languages. The programme makes use of the rich context of Birkbeck's position in Bloomsbury, in London's West End, by giving the analysis of live performance a central place in the curriculum, and by drawing on guest speakers and practitioners. Students completing this programme will be well-placed to develop their careers in the theatre and the arts

more broadly as artists, creative producers, or arts managers, or to undertake further study at postgraduate level.

Aims:

- Enable students to develop their knowledge and skills relating to theatrical performance and arts management
- Offer a balanced programme of study that combines compulsory modules and flexible option choice to enable students to engage with theatre studies and arts management in a range of contexts
- Deepen students' awareness of the practice of theatremaking and systems of management and organisation within the arts sector
- Offer a broad understanding of the relation between practices of research, interpretation and organisational practice in theatre and arts management
- Enable students to engage critically with theatre and arts management as practices
- Facilitate the development of students' independent critical judgement
- Enable students to develop work-related knowledge and skills in relation to doing and managing creative work
- Offer students a conceptual grounding in critical and theoretical literatures in theatre and arts management
- Develop students' skills of critical reflection upon individual practice and in group contexts
- Offer students the opportunity to undertake and complete a dissertation project with an option to originate a piece of creative practice

are introduced to in seminars and lectures through practice. This enables students to take a 'laboratory' approach, where they hypothesise on an aspect of theatre, and test this hypothesis through practice. They are then assessed, not on their practical skills, but rather on their reflective and analytical engagement with the concepts they have explored. This process of learning will be supplemented by independent research, independent group work and theatre visits.

Arts management modules broadly comprise a combination of lectures and seminars with a strong emphasis on peer collaboration and a range of individual and group-based assignments that span academic and practice contexts. These will include both theoretical essays and specific assignments in areas such as project development and strategic management. For their dissertation, students will have the opportunity to produce a real-world project related to their chosen specialism or conduct empirical research on the contemporary arts industries. Specific modules may incorporate blended learning elements; opportunities for work-based learning; seminars; guest 'masterclass' lectures; and site visits.

## <sup>18</sup> **Programme Description**

BA Theatre Studies and Arts Management builds students' skills and knowledges in theatre and arts management incrementally through a programme which offers training in key skills of interpretation, critical analysis, creative practice, and professional skills development applicable to arts and creative industries. At level 4, students engage in theatre history, performance analysis, an introduction to the creative industries, and take an option module drawn from the selection on offer across the School of Arts, including modules in theatre or arts management. At level 5, students develop more advanced knowledge in theatre theory, creative labour, and curatorial praxis, and take an option module in theatre. At level 6, students develop their own dissertation projects and self-led critical projects engaging with live performance, in tandem with a compulsory module addressing audience development, and an option module drawn from the selection on offer in the School of Arts.
