17	<p>Learning, teaching and assessment methods</p> <p>Learning is achieved through a balance of formal pedagogy and independent study, with an emphasis upon the latter, suitable to this level of study in a humanities subject. Teaching is done primarily via seminar group, with occasional lectures; and in one-to-one tutorials as and when necessary. Where appropriate, use is made of on-line resources including Moodle.</p> <p>Those students taking the online route through the programme, or who select one or more of the online modules as part of their studies, will be taught through a mixture of online seminars, live and recorded lecture material, and a range of additional online resources.</p> <p>Assessment is via written work, with a different essay for each module, and a substantial dissertation.</p>

18	<p>Programme Description</p> <p>The programme consists of four taught modules and a dissertation. All students take the core module 'Mastering Historical Research' in the first term of their degree. They then have a choice of a further three option modules (taken across two years for the part-time degree, or within one year for the full-time degree). There is also skills training in preparation for the dissertation in the spring term of the first year of study; students receive one-to-one supervision for their dissertation research, and the dissertation is then submitted in the middle of September in the year in which the degree is completed.</p> <p>Most options are delivered in-person, some are delivered both in-person and online, and some online only.
