¹⁴ **Programme Rationale & Aims**

This programme is designed for students who are interested in both the social scientific, linguistic study of the English language and its literary and cultural manifestations. The programme explores how the English language is acquired, structured and has been/is used in different social situations and (con)texts (spoken/written). Students will develop an indepth knowledge of the structure and function of language below and above the sentence/utterance – studying phonetics, phonology, grammar, semiotics, pragmatics and discourse. They will learn how language is acquired and how it is stored and processed in the mind/brain; and what happens when things go wrong. They will also explore sociolinguistic and literary issues, including how the use of English varies across time and space, in different social groups and settings, online and offline, and its role in institutional structures, (e.g. media, politics), and in the increasingly globalised world. Our diverse and interdisciplinary portfolio of modules will enable students to explore language in the contemporary world and learn how to apply this knowledge to their future career. In the third year, students will have the opportunity to carry out their own project or extended critical literature review in an area of study which enthuses them, with the support of a supervisor. We offer a friendly and supportive environment in which you will be able to design a course geared towards your own interests and career objectives.

	For this degree students take 360 credits: 120 at Level 4; 120 at Level 5; and 120 at Level 6. The final degree title is determined by the balance of credits to be taken in the areas of English and linguistics, e.g. students who achieve no more than 210 credits in English and 150 credits or more from modules taken in linguistics will be eligible for the BA English and Linguistics degree title. BA English with Linguistics requires students to take at least 90 credits in Linguistic modules, while students with a focus on Linguistic modules could be awarded BA Linguistics with English if they have more than 210 credits in Linguistics modules and at least 90 credits in English modules (and meet the overall requirements for award of the degree above).
