¹⁴ Programme Rationale & Aims

The MSc Global Politics explores the history of global political and economic forces and the ideas that have shaped them. It considers and evaluates the genesis and transmission of neoliberal economic orthodoxy, the development of global politics and global structures of governance, including the creation and operation of institutions such as the World Trade Organization, foreign direct investment, migration, and the idea and reality of globalisation.

It aims to develop students' ability to analyse political debates and issues in a critical manner, via teaching by academics with expertise in global history and politics. The course combines theoretical approaches with empirical knowledge and real-world case studies.

A second-class honours degree (2:2) or above in a social science or other relevant subject, or equivalent professional experience (subject to interview).

16 Learning Outcomes

On successful completion of the programme, a student will have

- Familiarity with a broad range of theoretical approaches in politics and the ways they are brought to bear on current global political issues;
- Understanding: a) key aspects of the history, politics and institutions of global governance as a response to the challenges of globalisation, and; b) gaining a familiarity with key issues and policy debates in international political economy;



- Understanding of major lines of contestation and critique within politics, and how these relate to political debates in the wider world;
- A knowledge of contemporary research in politics, including engagement with the research done by members of the teaching staff through their research-led teaching, via readings, workshops and seminars;
- An understanding of key approaches to research design in politics, the issues they present and their implications for doing political research;
- Enhancement of generic intellectual skills, particularly relating to clear and persuasive communication of ideas, and engagement with political arguments.

Learning, teaching and assessment methods

The programme uses the established teaching and assessment methods on the Politics MSc programmes, consisting of lectures and seminars for taught modules, along with a dissertation.

Depending on the module, students submit essays, research projects, take-home exams and unseen exams, and also take quizzes, participate in online forums and maintain seminar logs during the teaching period.

¹⁸ | Programme Description

The MSc Global Politics introduces students to literature, concepts and debates in global security, global politics and International Political Economy within the academic discourse and discipline of international relations.

Students take four core modules and four options (all 15 credits) and write a 60 credit dissertation. This is the standard structure for Politics masters programmes. Full-time students take all eight taught modules Oct-July and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept. Part-time students take four modules each year (two core in each year) and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept of their second year.
