Learning, teaching and assessment methods

The programme uses the established teaching and assessment methods on the Politics MSc programmes, consisting of lectures and seminars for taught modules, along with a dissertation. The programme is offered in person and there is also a fully online route. Options for students taking the online route are restricted to modules offered in the Department with an online seminar (the core modules on the MSc Public Policy and Management and selected others). Prerecorded lectures are provided online for both inperson and online modes. In-person and online classes run once a week over 90 minutes. Assessment on core taught modules will consist of either an essay or an open-book exam worth 90% of the final mark, and a 10% seminar participation mark.

18 | Programme Description

Students take four core modules and four options (all 15 credits) and write a 60 credit dissertation. Full-time students take all taught modules Oct-July and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept. Part-time students take four taught modules each year (two core in each year) and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept of their second year.
