¹⁴ Programme Rationale & Aims

This MSc is strongly research-led. It is aligned with the work of the Politics research group, Population, Environment and Resources, and its two compulsory modules draw directly on the research interests of the group.

Population and demography have become important political issues. Aging populations in the developed world; the 'youth bulge' and continuing rapid population growth of sub-Saharan Africa and parts of west Asia; and the mass urbanization of the developing world all have pronounced political implications. Global military power is related to relative population size and age structure, patterns of which are changing rapidly. Shifts in the ethnic and religious composition of countries, partly due to migration flows, are connected to tensions around national identity, immigration policy and multiculturalism in the UK and other western countries.

Population growth and movement have pronounced implications for natural and social ecologies. Critical political analysis of these implications examines the discursive frameworks within which population questions are constructed and debated. The programme will enable students to see how political economy, demography and the environment are interrelated at theoretical and policy levels. Different theoretical approaches to population matters will be discussed and linked to new terms of environmental discourse (sustainability, resilience, decoupling, natural capital, environmental services etc).

A strength of the programme is that students are introduced to a spectrum of methodological approaches, ranging from quantitative techniques for analysing and projecting demographic changes to discourse analysis of policy documents and historical case studies of political debates and associated political movements.

The programme has links with interdisciplinary initiatives within SSHP to build on overlapping interests within the School in the area of environmental studies

Distinctive Features:

- Part-time, evening, face-to-face study
- Taught by leading figures in the field
- Providing theoretical and empirical insights into topical and controversial issues around population growth and social stability
- International perspective: informed by relevant case studies from a number of countries.
- Methodologically wide-ranging and ambitious, combining statistical techniques, policy studies, discourse analysis and critical theory.

¹⁸ Programme Description

Students take four core modules and four options (all 15 credits) and write a 60 credit dissertation. This is the standard structure for Politics masters programmes. Full-time students take all taught modules Oct-July and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept. Part-time students take four modules each year (two core in each year) and submit their dissertation by 15 Sept of their second year.
