Admissions requirements

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

Our entry requirement is usually a second-class honours degree (2:2) (or overseas equivalent) in a relevant subject and/or relevant professional training and language teaching experience.

If English is not your first language, you will need an English language qualification (IELTS 6.5 or equivalent with minimum 6.0 in sub-sets) completed within the last 2 years, unless you can provide evidence that you have completed a degree in an English-speaking university. An interview may be required. You may also be asked to complete a short written task of no more than 500 words.

Course aims

The MA in Applied Linguistics and Communications is designed for people interested in (or working in) a wide variety of academic and professional fields that deal in a significant way with language. It provides an opportunity to explore both applied and theoretical aspects of linguistics and to undertake empirical and/or theoretical research into language and linguistic behaviour. This MA programme aims to enable you to develop an informed and critical awareness of issues of linguistic analysis and language use; to develop your awareness of the empirical relevance and applications of theoretical issues in linguistics, and, where appropriate, to actively explore these issues in the context of your own experience of language as a user, learner, teacher or researcher; and to provide an intellectually stimulating environment in which you can develop your individual intellectual interests.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Teaching takes several forms, including lectures, seminars, discussions, workshops and presentations.

How we will assess you

Assessments for the Core modules and Options are coursework based.

Students work towards the completion EITHER of a 5-6,000-word independent literature review (30 credits) OR, particularly for those who wish to take a PhD in the future, a 12-15,000 word dissertation (60 credits). If you wish to pursue an academic career/research it is advisable that you opt to complete the dissertation.

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

At the end of this course, you should be able to demonstrate:

- A good appreciation of basic concepts, modes of analysis and theoretical approaches in linguistics
- An advanced knowledge of a range of empirical linguistic phenomena, coupled with relevant descriptive terminology
- A good appreciation of the nature of human language, its structural properties, and its functions
- A critical ability to construct and evaluate linguistic arguments in the context of analysis of data, and competing explanations
- Reasoning skills
- Critique and evaluation
- Appreciation of scientific method
- An ability to synthesise ideas and information
- A capacity for abstract modelling
- Appreciation of the role of theory, and the relation of data to theory

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations. Each new course or module is subject to a course approval process where the proposal is scrutinised by subject specialists, quality professionals and external representatives to ensure that it will offer an excellent student experience and meet the expectation of regulatory and other professional bodies.

We conduct an annual process of reviewing our portfolio of courses which analyses student achievement, equality data and includes an action plan for each department to identify ongoing enhancements to our education, including changes made as a result of student feedback.

Our periodic review process is a regular check (usually every four years) on the courses by department with a specialist team including students.

Each course will have an external examiner associated with it who produces an annual report and any recommendations. Students can read the most recent external examiner reports on the course Moodle pages. Our courses are all subject to Birkbeck Baseline Standards for our Moodle module information. This supports the accessibility of our education including expectations of what information is provided online for students.
