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Admissions requirements

We welcome applicants without traditional entry qualifications as we base decisions on our own assessment of qualifications, knowledge and previous work experience. We may waive formal entry requirements based on judgement of academic potential.

Several years of post-qualifying experience in a helping profession such as counselling, psychology, social work or psychiatry.

We also have a popular two-year **advanced standing** programme for qualified psychoanalytic psychotherapists (child, adult or group).

A requirement of the course is that all students undertake **personal psychoanalytic psychotherapy of at least 3 times a week** usually commencing at least 1 year before starting the course. This requirement may be modified for entrants with Advanced Standing. Psychotherapists must be experienced members of the British Psychoanalytic Council and will need to be approved by the Training Committee. The current cost of personal psychoanalytic psychotherapy is likely to range between £50 to £90 per session. Fees are negotiated directly between the student and the therapist.

Course aims

Academic

- To provide students with the advanced theoretical knowledge required to become professional couple psychoanalytic psychotherapists
- To provide the academic requirements of the training leading towards accreditation with the British Psychoanalytic Council (BPC)

Clinical/Professional

- To develop the ability to practice couple psychoanalytic psychotherapy with sufficient self-reflexive capacity to take account of unconscious processes
- To respond appropriately to matters of risk and safeguarding

Self-development

 To develop an analytical understanding of self and other, and relational dynamics, via students' own experience of intensive (three times a week or more) personal analytic psychotherapy

Course structure

Year 1

In year 1 students study the development of psychoanalytic thought and attend a clinical skills seminar where they practice the techniques needed to work psychoanalytically with couples. Personal development happens in their own personal therapy. Tutorials enable learning to be embedded. In addition, students begin clinical work in person at TR's premises in the City of London and attend weekly individual supervision and a clinical seminar where they discuss each other's work. Students often undertake their Infant Observation in this year, attending a weekly seminar to support this. They also undertake their psychiatric placement, if needed.

Years 2 & 3

In years 2 and 3 the clinical work with couples continues under weekly individual supervision. They attend Couple Theory seminars and Clinical Seminars in both years. Tutorials and personal therapy continue as before. There are also a series of Essentials workshops that focus on particular aspects of the work such as sexuality, race and diversity, clinical technique, and research.

Year 4

Year 4 is the MA dissertation year where students identify a clinical topic of interest and address it through an extended case study, a theoretical study, or a piece of small-scale research. Student's clinical work, supervision, clinical seminars, tutorials, and personal therapy all continue until qualification.

How you will learn

Your learning and teaching is organised to help you meet the learning outcomes (below) of the course. As a student, we expect you to be an active learner and to take responsibility for your learning, engaging with all of the material and sessions arranged for you.

Each course is divided into modules. You will find information on the virtual learning site (Moodle, see Academic Support below) about each of your modules, what to expect, the work you need to prepare, links to reading lists, information about how and when you will be assessed.

Your learning for this course will be organised around the activities outlined below.

Lectures, seminars, group work, self-directed study, assessed written work, presentation of cases, assessed group presentations, tutorials, presentation of seminar papers workshops, experiential work, and seminar papers. Reading of key texts for each week. Lectures/seminars introducing psychoanalytic thinkers and key theoretical developments. Critical discussion of key texts.

Individual supervision of clinical work, Presentation of students' clinical work to a weekly group of students, led by a Senior Couple Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist, in order to focus on the detail of and reflection about interactive processes observed both in the consulting room and in the workshop. How we will assess you

The course will use a variety of assessment methods. Assessment is used to enhance your learning rather than simply to test it. For most of the modules associated with this course, your assessment will be through the following types of assessment.

Process Recording/Recorded Session Analysis and evaluation, Couple Theory Paper, Clinical Practice and Theory Paper, Seminar review paper, Dissertation

This assessment goes alongside professional assessment of your clinical practice. To obtain the MA you must pass both the academic and clinical parts of the training/programme.

Learning outcomes (what you can expect to achieve)

'Learning outcomes' indicate what you should be able to know or do at the end of your course. Providing them helps you to understand what your teachers will expect and also the learning requirements upon which you will be assessed.

Critically reflect upon an extended range of psychoanalytic thought/research findings and evaluate their relevance to the couple relationship and practice, including the sexual relationship

Demonstrate an understanding of psychosexual development and sexuality through the life cycle

Demonstrate theoretical knowledge of causes of violence and aggression within couple relationships

Demonstrate theoretical knowledge of issues around separation, divorce, conflict and the impact on family life.

Identify and justify the choice of a particular style and approach for particular clients and presenting problems

- You will be eligible to apply for registration with the British Psychoanalytic Council (BPC)
- You will be eligible for registration with the College of Sexual and Relationship Therapists (COSRT)
- Graduates are eligible for TR's training in Individual Psychodynamic Psychotherapy (BPC), for advanced standing into TR's Psychosexual Training (COSRT) as well as advanced standing into the Individual Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Training at the British Psychotherapy Foundation (BPC).
- You will become part of Tavistock relationships alumni group, and take advantage of their high quality CPD and conferences which will help you keep on top of recent developments in the field and to further develop your clinical practice

Quality and standards at Birkbeck

Birkbeck's courses are subject to our quality assurance procedures. This means that new courses must follow our design principles and meet the requirements of our academic regulations.
